

MAIN DIFFERENCES/ THINGS LEARNED FROM THE EXCHANGE AT POW

- Overall, similar in terms of clinical practice and policies
- Patients are discharged home after CS at 24hrs
- Insertion IUD at time of CS very common
- All patients are assessed using Growth Assessment Protocol app, GAP grow, at booking to determine a personalized antenatal growth chart
- All patients receive departmental growth scan at 32w, 36w, 38w
- Diabetes clinic patients only seen by obs/endo consultant. No trainees
- SHOs not doing nights/call done with I reg and I AMP
- Obs/gynae training is 7 years STI-ST7 and mainly based in one hospital group
- All trainees no matter what grade have option to work 60%/80% i.e 3 days or 4 days a week
- No private patients in public NHS hospitals but there are private obstetric hospitals in UK
